Council's Adult Rec. Initiative has had some growth over the past year, however there is still quite a bit of work to be done. Bryan Swain has attended meetings in a few Branches over the past year to explain the positives of the program and hopefully will be able to get to more meetings in the upcoming year. Our website has information on registration, insurance, tournaments and league guidelines along with other information pertaining to the program. Work is ongoing on the hosting of two Adult Rec. tournaments held in conjunction with the 2008 Men's Worlds, a 40 team event in Quebec City (May 8 – 11) and a 100 team event in Halifax (May 5 – 10). Council will be forming a committee to oversee the operation of the events. The hope is that the promotional rewards from holding these world events will greatly advance the status of the Adult Rec. Initiative.

The promotion of inter-branch playoffs for senior hockey below the Major Senior AAA level is an area, I feel, that we as Council may have jumped the gun on. We have tried for 3 years to get playoffs going and every year they have fallen through for one reason or another. Senior hockey below the AAA level is alive and doing very well and it seems that the teams that participate are not really that interested in inter-branch play at this point in time.

The question of additional funding for the Allan Cup champions to travel to international tournaments is at this time a bit of a non-issue, with the announcement that there isn't much interest from the members of the IIHF in having the winners of the Allan Cup come and play against their national teams. Council is in the process of looking into other options for the Allan Cup champions to take part in and hopefully we will be able to have them represent Canada at some event each year. The televising of the 100th Anniversary of the Allan Cup final game in 2008 hosted by Brantford, Ont. may help get a national sponsor for the hosts of future Allan Cups. Council will have some important decisions to make over the next little while regarding sponsorship.

Congratulations to the Lloydminster Border Kings on winning this year's Allan Cup in Stony Plain, Alberta. The games were all very entertaining and I feel that there was more parity this year than at any of the Allan Cups that I have had the opportunity to attend. The officiating was great and any of the officials could have worked the final game. The Host Committee did a tremendous job and must be commended. The attendance was excellent, being sold out well before the event started. The last 3 games of the tournament was standing room only and the fans were not disappointed with the caliber of the play.

I would like to say in closing that my time spent on the Hockey Canada Board has been most enjoyable. I will not forget all the great people from across this country that I have met and had the opportunity to work with during my time serving as Chairman of Senior / Adult Rec. for the Saskatchewan Hockey Association and then as Director of Senior Council for Hockey Canada. Thank you for the opportunity, support and the great experiences.

It has been a pleasure to serve as Officer for Senior Council for the past two years. In addition to being an enjoyable association, it has certainly been a learning experience. The roots of Hockey Canada, and of course the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association runs deep within the Senior Council. Given demographic patterns that are staring us in the face, it should be clear that Adult Recreation Hockey holds significant potential to enhance the membership of our organization. Senior Council and staff of Hockey Canada must continue to make concerted efforts to engage adults and convince them of the benefits of affiliating with us. Every Branch faces unmet opportunities to grow their numbers with *baby boomers* as well as immigrants and youth who want to experience our national game. Members of Senior Council have the opportunities to develop strategies to recruit new members to Hockey Canada.

This past February, I had the privilege of accompanying our Allan Cup Champions from Powell River, BC to a Tournament in Belarus. It was an experience our players, and a handful of fans who accompanied them, will never forget. The team conducted themselves in a manner expected of Canadian hockey players and they were a credit to Senior Hockey. The many Belarus fans that filled stadiums throughout the tournament appreciated their tenacious play.

Unfortunately it appears that European federations have lost interest in inviting or hosting our national domestic champions. Despite considerable efforts to find international events for our champs, it has become increasingly clear that the international tournaments for Allan Cup winners are no longer a viable option. Efforts to promote the Senior Game must move beyond the promise of an international tour. National television coverage of the Allan Cup will be a welcomed addition, yet we must realize that all Branches all have challenges to attract attention to the Senior and Adult game.

With the election of a new Chairman, Officer assignments to specific Councils are likely to change. I would like to thank each member of Senior Council for their hospitality during my tenure and their dedication to the game. Thank you to Lorne Wilm for his leadership within Council. He has chosen to pursue other interests and we respect his decision with gratitude for stepping up and serving in a leadership role. It is now an opportunity for someone else to fill the role of Director and I hope every member of Council considers this opportunity and chance to serve the game at a new level.

Thank you for your ongoing commitment to Senior and Adult hockey. I look forward to our Council discussions in Winnipeg!

BC Hockey 2007 AGM Senior Hockey Report

Senior AAA

Three teams were entered in the AAA category for the 06-07 season. The Fort St John Flyers, Powell River Regals and Trail Smokeaters met in Powell River in March and competed in a Round Robin tournament to determine our representative in the BC-Alberta Allan Cup play-downs.

Fort St John, in their first season at the AAA level, emerged as the Savage Cup Champion defeating defending National Champion Powell River in the final of this five day event. The Flyers then went on to play the Bentley Generals (Hockey Alberta) in the Mackenzie Cup and gave a tremendous account of themselves taking the Alberta Champions to a fifth and deciding game before bowing out.

The Flyer organization represented our Province very well on and off the ice and will be a force to be reckoned with for years to come. Competing in an Alberta league and being on the ice consistently gave the Flyers a large advantage over the Regals and Smokies who worked hard and traveled far and wide playing exhibition games.

Powell River enjoyed their second International tour playing in a Division 1 tournament in Belarus in February. A great time was had by all and from all accounts it was a tremendous experience.

Senior AA

The Central Interior Hockey League enjoyed another successful season this past year. The nine team league is growing and refining its operational procedures with every new season. The league, under the watchful eye of President Rose Ruffel, will hold their AGM in late April where several key issues will be addressed.

The CIHL was represented in the 2007 Coy Cup by the League Champion Kitimat Ice-Demons and runners up Williams Lake Stampeders.

The 2007 Coy Cup was hugely successful even though the Host Committee had a short window of preparation time. Along with the host Rossland Warriors and the two CIHL clubs, the four team field was completed by the North Island Capitals. The host Warriors took it on the chin in their first round robin game getting pummeled 12-0 by Kitimat but regrouped and battled back playing 5 games in 5 days to edge round robin winner Kitimat in the final 6-5 in a thrilling game before a packed house.

Congratulations to the Warriors and all their volunteers.

Senior A

Our collegiate category got off the ground this year in a big way under the guidance of Jeff DuBois. The League is attracting more interest and the upcoming season could see additional teams added to the loop. University of Victoria took home the hardware this season and my thanks to Neil Hartley for being on hand in Langley to present the trophy in what he described as a very entertaining and well-played finale.

Adult Recreational Hockey

New initiatives and a new game-plan were introduced last year as Hockey Canada and its Branches are making a concerted effort to attract adult Males and Females into our structure. There are considerably more Adults playing hockey in Canada than children and we are working hard from coast to coast attempting to get these men and women under the Hockey Canada umbrella.

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Senior hockey in our Branch seems to be remaining constant both in the number of teams as well as the number of players registered. Manitoba has 6 Senior Leagues with approximately 1050 players. We are expecting some realignment of teams in the leagues in western Manitoba as there still seems to be a large number of players going west to the oil patch and not returning Alberta should show an increase in numbers just from Manitoba players alone.

We had only 1 AAA Senior team register this past season and the outlook is not much brighter for next year at this point in time. I fielded several calls from teams expressing some interest but the cost of operating a AAA club appears to have scared them off. The '09 Allan Cup in Manitoba is still a big issue with some major hurdles yet to be overcome. The arena in Brandon where it was intended to be played has dropped out of the picture as the host team has been unable to secure any solid commitment with regards to ice availability. The Brandon Wheat Kings, as primary tenant, have first rights to the ice and it is difficult to negotiate any kind of deal as they could still be in the WHL playoffs at that time of year. There is an attempt to secure an arena in Winnipeg at this time, hopefully I will have more information by AGM time.

The HCAR program is still a very tough sell in Manitoba and I don't anticipate it to move any quicker than in the past. Many AR leagues are run by private individuals who provide ice times as well as making a very substantial amount of income. One operator has got the local Access TV station to televise a Game of the Week on the local channel.

In closing, I would like to Thank all the Council Reps for the job that they do in support of Senior Hockey in their Branches and for the expertise that they bring to the Hockey Canada table. Special mention to Bryan Swain for his efforts in his first year at Senior Council and also in his HCAR management position. Personally, I will miss having Lorne at the head of the table and at the end of the phone line. I wish him well in the future.

SUMMARY REPORT

Senior Competitive Hockey

Jurisdiction for Senior Competitive Hockey in the OHF is allocated to OHF Member Partner, the Ontario Hockey Association (OHA).

For the 2006/07 season two Senior Hockey Leagues operated in the OHA. The five (5) team **Ontario Major Senior AAA Hockey League**, comprised of the Brantford Blast, Dundas Real McCoys, Petrolia Squires, Tillsonburg Vipers and Windsor St. Clair (College) Saints; and the four (4) team **Eastern Ontario Senior Hockey League**, comprised of the Frankford Huskies, Marmora Lakers, Norwood Vipers and the Whitby Dunlops.

All five teams in the Major Senior League along with Norwood and Whitby in the Eastern League were registered AAA teams with HC. Frankford and Marmosa registered as Senior A.

Brantford and Whitby were the respective League Champions with Whitby defeating Brantford for the OHA and OHF (Branch) Sr. AAA Championship. Whitby subsequently defeated Kenora (HNO Branch) for the right to represent Ontario at the 2007 Allan Cup in Winnipeg.

Windsor's St. Clair College's entry in Sr. AAA competition in 2006/07 season proved to be a successful undertaking. It was very competitive finishing in first place in regular season play but losing out to Brantford in its League final. The OHF and OHA are hopeful other Ontario Community College's will give consideration to reestablishing hockey programming and applying for entry to the OHA's Senior Hockey Leagues.

For 2007-08 the Eastern Ontario Senior Hockey League has received expressions of interest regarding a possible new entry from Oshawa along with the return of the Deseronto and Kingston entries, at new locations where there are new arenas.

Adult Recreation Hockey

The OHF has designated the OHA as its registrar for Adult Recreation Hockey programming.

In 2006/07 season three (3) Touring Teams, the Canadian Moose, Cambridge Travel and Woodstock Oldtimers, registered with Hockey Canada's Adult Recreation Program (HCAR). Additionally the Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) Alumni of St. Catharines registered a four (4) team league (59 players).

Getting HCAR Program information out to Ontario's Adult Recreation Leagues has proven to be a real challenge to date. For 2007/08 we are soliciting the support of the Ontario Recreation and Arena Association to assist us in marketing the program to Ontario's AR Associations and Leagues

Acting as the OHF/OHA Program Facilitator for HCAR I have been referred quite a few expressions of interest from Bryan Swain at Hockey Canada about next year.

However we still need to:

- Formalize and make public HC's requirements regarding HCAR Game Officials.
- Improve HCAR Marketing: required if we are going to be successful in SELLING the benefits of HCAR to present operating Leagues and Associations whether playing in private or public facilities.
- Make the necessary amendments in our HCAR Program costing to make HCAR remain a profitable alternative as an Operating Partnership Undertaking for Private Association and League Operators.
- Finalize and publish HCAR Pick-Up Hockey Guidelines and recruit communities to offer HCAR Pick-Up Visitor Opportunities to business and/or recreation travelers by advertising these opportunities on HCAR's Website.

HCAR: we have the Vision – let us work together to Make it Reality!!!

MAY 18- 20, 2007***

The 2006-2007 season saw an increase in our Adult recreational programs with a total of 42 teams registering. This was a 46% increase in the number of teams registering with the Branch from the 2006-2007 season. This number translated into some 546 players joining the Hockey Canada family through ODHA .

Our goal for the summer of 2007 is to schedule meetings with the local municipality staff, private arena operators and larger Adult Rec. leagues in the Branch in an attempt to increase our numbers once again for next season.

On the Senior Hockey front, once again our efforts have not met with a favorable response. This is largely due to the escalating cost and despite relentless efforts to kick start a Senior team in the Branch this past season ownership was not prepared to move forward with a team. It does not appear likely that in the near future a Senior team will surface, but the Branch continues to be optimistic and research all venues and opportunities of having Senior hockey back at some point. As the old James Bond movie goes "NEVER SAY DIE"..

I would like to once again offer our thanks and congratulations to the committee who continue to work so diligently on formulating the Adult Rec. program. I firmly believe that if we want ADULT REC to flourish we have to work as a team to make it happen. I also feel that we need to exchange ideas openly, maintain a standard pricing, utilize the HC Adult Rec brochure which should include Branch contact people.

ODHA is looking forward to hearing more over the weekend in relationship to the long range direction that we should implement if we are to succeed in ensuring that Adult Rec. becomes a viable partner in Hockey Canada family.

Another successful season has come to an end. Although there was a decrease of senior competitive players, we had a notable increase in adult recreational hockey. The registration numbers were the highest so far which made for an interesting year in our Branch.

We had four Senior A leagues registered. In total, there were 24 teams and 673 players registered. No team registered at the AAA level this past season.

The Saint John River Rock of the Southern Hockey League hosted our Provincial Senior A Hockey Championship from April 4 to 8, 2007. The North Shore Hockey League was not represented. This league had to cancel its participation because it was still in playoffs at the time of the championship.

The Grand Lake Thrashers of the Southern Hockey League were the Provincial winners as they defeated the host team, the Saint John River Rock, 3-0 in the championship game.

As mentioned above, our branch saw an important increase in adult recreational hockey this past season. The promotion of the HARC had a positive impact on the registration numbers and hopefully they will keep increasing.

I have plans to visit, with the district directors, a number of municipalities in the Northern part of the province before the next hockey season. I want to gather rink managers, leagues and club representatives for information sessions on the HCAR hockey program. Hopefully, this will create an increase in player registration next season.

In closing, senior hockey continues to be an integral part of winter entertainment in our province. At this time, I want to take the opportunity to thank all the volunteers, league executives, team operators and players for continuing the rich tradition of senior hockey in New Brunswick and Canadian communities.

HOCKEY CANADA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HNL SENIOR COUNCIL REPORT

Senior hockey in Newfoundland and Labrador experienced another extremely successful year within our Branch. We operated two Senior Leagues in 2006-2007 with approximately 260 players.

The Avalon East Senior Hockey League was comprised of four (4) teams. They were the Conception Bay North Cee Bee Stars, Southern Shore Breakers, Mount Pearl Blades and the Torbay Skyway Steelers. The League played a twenty four (24) game schedule plus playoffs. The Southern Shore Breakers and the Conception Bay North Cee Bee Stars advanced to the League finals which were won by the CBN Cee Bee Stars in a seven (7) game final. The CBN Cee Bee Stars will represent the Avalon East League in the Telegram Herder Finals.

The West Coast Senior Hockey League was comprised of four (4) teams this year with the addition of the Clarenville Caribous to join the Grand Falls-Windsor Cataracts, the Deer Lake Red Wings and the Corner Brook Royals. They played a twenty (20) game schedule plus playoffs. The Deer Lake Red Wings and the Grand Falls-Windsor Cataracts advanced to the league finals which were won by the Deer Lake Red Wings in five (5) games. The Deer Lake Red Wings will represent the League in the Telegram Herder Finals.

The Telegram Herder Championships were played in Corner Brook at the Pepsi Centre on April 7 & 8 and in St. John's at the Mile One Center on April 13, 14 & 15. The finals continued in Corner Brook on April 21 with the Conception Bay North Cee Bee Stars winning the Telegram Herder Memorial Trophy in six games.

A point of interest is that the three (3) games at the Pepsi Center and the three (3) games at the Mile One Center were completely sold out for a grand total of 24,560 paid admissions.

In Recreation Hockey we had three (3) Leagues register with approximately 283 players.

A) Personal objectives for the 2007-09 hockey seasons.

My personal objectives include increasing the Allan Cup's exposure and developing the adult recreation program so that it may see successful growth.

B) Long range personal objectives.

My long range objectives include working to see the growth of senior hockey in all parts of Canada, from the Adult Recreation Program to the Senior AAA level.

C) Immediate objectives for Hockey Canada.
